

#### Budget Fact Sheet Fiscal Year 2022-2023

The Board of Education of the Cheektowaga-Sloan Union Free School District on April 19, 2022 adopted the District's budget for the 2022-2023 fiscal year for presentation to qualified District voters. The proposed budget appropriations of \$38,154,824 represent an increase of \$915,093 over the current year's budget of \$37,239,731. The increase in total authorized spending is 2.46%.

The most significant increases in the budget appropriations were in regular education, special educational service area and student transportation services. These increases are similar to those experienced by other public school districts and are reflective of services and related costs mandated by New York State.

The major components of the budget are:

- Salaries and benefits are by far the most significant costs in the proposed budget. They total \$23,055,319, which equates to 60.4% of the entire budget
- Contractual appropriations (which include utilities, student transportation, insurance, postage and various other expenditures) are the next largest component of the proposed budget. They total \$7,457,925, which equates to 19.5% of the budget.
- BOCES services (which include services to certain special education students, technical education, computer support and maintenance, administrative and various other support services) are the next largest component of the proposed budget. They total \$4,281,931, which equates to 11.2% of the budget.
- The remaining 8.9% of the proposed budget includes debt service payments (bonds for school improvement projects), materials and supplies and equipment.

The total tax levy (including taxes levied to property owners and STAR) for the District's 2022-2023 fiscal year is proposed to be \$15,617,553. As compared to the District's total tax levy in 2022-2023 of \$15,467,632, there is an increase of \$149,921 or 0.97%.



#### CHEEKTOWAGA-SLOAN UFSD GRADUATION PATHWAYS DATA 2021

The Board of Regents approved regulations establishing multiple, comparably rigorous assessment pathways to graduation for all students. The recently approved regulations recognize the importance of engaging students' interests in rigorous and relevant academic programs in the Arts; Languages other than English (LOTE)/Biliteracy; Career and Technical Education (CTE); Humanities; Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM); and Career Developmental Occupational Studies (CDOS). The revised regulation allows students to use a passing score on an approved pathway assessment or successful completion of program requirements for the CDOS credential toward meeting the assessment requirements for graduation.
